

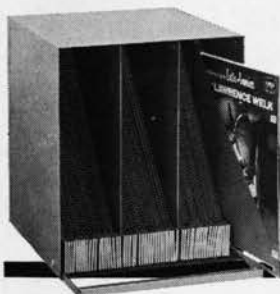

Discabinet for LP Records

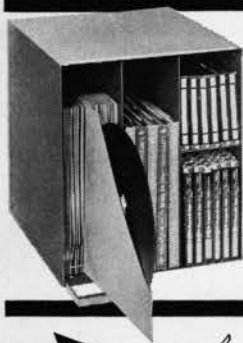
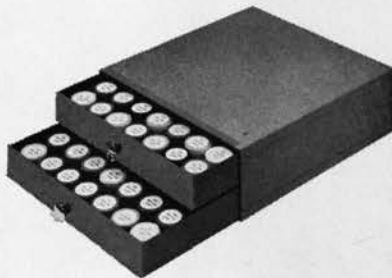
